

ach year, since our inception in 2005, has been more meaningful and more impactful than the last, and 2018 was no exception. his past year has been a busy year for the Roxy Board of Directors!

While much of the work that the Board has been doing has been "behind the scenes", the mission and the volunteers are always the focus. At the beginning of each Board meeting, we have a Mission Moment, a time where the Board members hear about (and meet) the teams that go out into the community each day and carry out the mission of Roxy.

In 2018, we have had the opportunity to hear from: a Deputy District Attorney, who sees



a child be brave and tell their story due to the courthouse program; a school district administrator, who encourages the spread of the literacy program throughout the district; high school students, who started the Roxy Therapy Dogs Club at their school to raise awareness; and one of our

committed Roxy teams that visit the medically fragile children at Pedia Manor.

The Board is fueled by the commitment of the volunteers that is exemplified during these moments, and we on the Board are committed to ensuring the sustainability and professionalism of Roxy Therapy Dogs. We have worked hard throughout 2018 to continue that effort. Efforts have been made to increase connection with the volunteers, financial security and transparency, and the qualifications of our volunteers.

One example of this work is the new Mandated Reporter Training policy that has been put into place. Mandated Reporting is one of the most important responsibilities that lays on the shoulders of volunteers who work with children. We know that our volunteers are committed to the safety and well-being of the children we serve, and the Board and entire organization is committed to ensuring that each and every volunteer, from Board member to volunteer team, is trained in and understands the responsibilities of being a Mandated Reporter. THANK YOU to everyone for taking the training. This makes each of us, and the entire organization, better prepared to carry out the duties of a Mandated Reporter and demonstrates a tremendous commitment to the children of our community.

Roxy has exclusive relationships with three of its venues

Roxy™ Therapy Dogs is very proud of the relationships and partnerships that have been formed with each of its venues. As a result of Roxy's long history in the community and the services provided to countless children, these partnerships have become exclusive.



Central Bucks School District

In May of 2018, Roxy Therapy Dogs and Central Bucks School District signed a mutual Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), stating that Roxy Therapy Dogs are the only therapy dog group to work with or enter Central Bucks Schools. Roxy programs in the schools are Elementary School Reading Inspiration, Student Specialized Support and Secondary School Stress Relief.

Doylestown Hospital's Carol and Louis Della Penna Pediatric Unit

When this unit was built several years ago, hospital administrators approached Roxy Therapy Dogs regarding visiting pediatric patients based on our long history of comforting children in the community. 

Highlights from Roxy Programs

Elementary School Reading Inspiration

Roxy's flagship program, formerly Literacy for All, is in its 14th year and utilizes the calming effects of a therapy dog to help young students become confident readers. Students who struggle with fluency, or who are uncomfortable reading aloud in front of their peers gain much- needed confidence with a non-judgmental canine friend by their side. The opportunity to practice reading aloud and develop this skill alongside a therapy dog is an invaluable tool and is the pathway to these students becoming confident life-long readers.





Student Specialized Support

Roxy is so proud that this program just keeps growing!


In classes where reading is not the focus, our certified pet therapy teams provide comfort and support for children with special educational and developmental needs. These classes include Autistic Support, Multiple Disability Support, and Life Skills. Some of these students are non-verbal but our dogs are able to form special connections with them and help them developmentally, socially, cognitively, emotionally and behaviorally.

"Does Panda like astronauts?"...

asks a young student, a second grader in the autistic support class. Panda, a sixteen pound pug leans against his side, while he points to pictures in the special book he picked out to read to Panda today. It helps that the boy says, "Panda, look!" And draws an imaginary line in the air to picture he wants to show Panda.

He cuddles with Panda on a red bean bag chair while he reads "loud and proud," as his teacher Mrs. Gallaway reminds him. The child is usually very soft spoken, but he's excited as he tells Panda about how the astronaut walks with a jet-pack and uses a robotic arm to repair the space ship. (As the voice of Panda, I share how much Panda likes it that he uses such big words in a clear voice to tell the story.)

We usually have four-way conversations in which Mrs Gallaway asks her students to tell Panda about their Halloween costumes or siblings. The children confide in Panda. And then Panda looks at me, and I tell them how much Panda likes Chewbacca or Elsa or what a good big brother or sister he thinks they are.

Since we're paying attention to social skills as well as reading, it's exciting that students who barely looked at me now say "Hi Miss Jen!" "How's Panda?" "Thank you, Miss Jen!" or "See you next week!"

Panda and I look forward to seeing them next week. Panda is excited whenever I put on his Roxy bandana.



In the fall, the class of seven was thrilled to meet sturdy little Panda with his wrinkled face and curly tail. The two children who escort him from the office are so proud of their Roxy dog. (As all classes do, they think they "have the best Roxy dog.") They're always very sensitive to the fact that if Panda's tail is straight, then he's not happy and want to cheer him up by petting him more gently.

Secondary School Stress Relief

Our Dogs Relax Students...SO THEY CAN COPE WITH LIFE'S CHALLENGES

"The Guidance Department runs groups aimed at helping teens who are struggling with anxiety and stress management, emotional issues, bereavement, and other concerns. Bringing the Roxy Therapy Dogs into these sessions has had an immediate and positive impact. Pediatric Comfort Doylestown Hospital

Roxy Therapy Dogs visits both the Doylestown Hospital and two
Pedia Manor Group Homes to comfort children with medical needs.

Sometimes the dogs bring comfort to many people in addition to the children. Here is a heartwarming story from one of our Board Members,

Cheryl Luginbuhl, and her trusty therapy dog, Finn.

Cheryl and Finn met a clergyman outside of Doylestown hospital.
Cheryl and Finn were walking Finn outside in preparation for their shift at the hospital when they encountered a clergyman exiting the hospital. Cheryl could just tell, just by the look on his face, that he was obviously undergoing something very difficult.

When Cheryl and Finn greeted him, the clergyman asked if he could have a moment with Finn. Finn, normally very rambunctious, instinctively placed his face in the man's lap and stared up into his eyes. She describes this as Finn's "soul scan." Finn instinctively knew to press his head against the man's chest, to which the man responded by embracing Finn and hung his head, falling into what Cheryl calls Finn's "heart hug."

Finn and the man stayed in that position for what seemed like a very long time. Cheryl, knowing she was witnessing a private moment between the two, backed away and allowed them to sit undisturbed. When the man stood up, he thanked Finn and turned to Cheryl to say "You will never know what that meant. Thank you all for all that you do..."

Pediatric Comfort *Pedia Manor*

Janet Stavrides and her Doberman, Nike, visit 5 classrooms in the Elementary School Reading Inspiration program. They also visit the Courthouse and Pedia Manor.

While visiting Pedia Manor, Janet was helping a child pet

Nike. The nurse who was watching the monitors reported that the child's heart rate immediately slowed down while petting Nike. Janet thought this was remarkable and now pays attention to the monitors when the children are petting Nike to look for a reaction. Janet also stated that the children that were afraid of Nike at first are now following her around when they visit.

Courthouse Companionship

Deputy District Attorney Kate Kohler was invited by Board member Kendal Beck to come and tell the board about how Roxy dogs helped one little girl get through two trials. The details of this case were heartbreaking to hear, it was un-

derstood how the little girl did not want to go to court. Kate told us without the dogs the girl would almost certainly never have relaxed enough to even step foot into the courtroom.

The girl actually had to testify at two separate trials. She was willing to appear for the second one ONLY IF she could be assured there would be dogs with her while she was waiting to testify. Kate's story made it clear to us what an instrumental role therapy dogs play in putting truly terrible abusers behind bars.

P.S. For those of you who are not familiar with the Courthouse program, each child receives a Roxy Puppy when the child meets with a Roxy therapy team. The hope is that the stuffed puppy will give the child comfort long after they have met a live Roxy puppy.











Roxy Volunteers Have

A Roxy Team with an Amazing Story!

work with other groups. One
of the groups we work with
is the Tri-State K-9 Crisis
Response Team. The dogs
have been further tested and the
handlers have received additional
training that qualifies the teams to
deploy into areas where there has
been a traumatic event, such as
school or nightclub shootings.

This past November, Tri-State was invited by the Ventura County Police to fly out for 5 days to provide comfort to the community after the Borderline Country Western Bar shootings. Kerri, my 5-year-old golden, and I were invited to go. On that same Thursday night, the wildfires broke out in this area so that by the time we flew out Sunday morning, our mission had already morphed into providing comfort to the fire evacuees.

Yes, we were nervous flying into the fire zone, but we trusted the police would not put us in jeopardy.

As it turns out, our hotel was one of the sites people evacuated to and firemen from other states stayed there too. What this meant to us was our dogs were working even when they were supposed to be resting. You couldn't walk them outside or go to the dining room without running into somebody that needed to pet your dog and talk to you

We visited the 12 cross memorial set up near the bar several times during our deployment, at different times of the day to try to reach a cross section of mourners. Some of the victims were students from the nearby college and others were older people with families. We visited the college and caused a huge commotion at Starbucks as the kids quickly texted/tweeted

their friends #Puppies at Starbucks! We returned a couple nights later for a candlelight vigil.

We were sent to differ-

ent evacuation sites on

different days, seeing

some of the same peo-

ple as sites shut down

and relocated. The dogs

were hugged and loved, and the people opened up to us to tell us of their situations. We popped into the central command station and let the policemen there play ball with the dogs. We visited a couple fire stations, the dispatch station, the Ventura Police station spreading joy and laughter, or sharing a shoulder or furry body to hug and cry on. The firemen were working long shifts even with the support of firemen from multiple states. The police had lost one of their men in the



shooting and emotions were running high at the station.

Ventura is a small, close-knit community. After a couple days we and our dogs were recognized by our uniforms and people were constantly thanking us for coming to help them. You could see the community band together to start to heal. The police and firemen were given tons of food and fundraising events popped up all over town.


Tri-State is based in Cherry Hill, but are expanding into PA and DE.


