News from Our Roxy President

As Roxy™ Therapy Dogs enters its 15th year with excited anticipation for all that a new year brings, it is important to also reflect on the year we just left behind, for everything that we accomplished then, has brought us to where we are now and shaped where we will go in the future. 2019 was certainly filled with many remarkable accomplishments for our organization. We welcomed 11 new teams which brought us to a record high of 85 teams. This increase in volunteers allowed us to serve more secondary students in 2019 than we ever have before. Volunteer hours dedicated to our Secondary Student Stress Relief program were up an impressive 36% from the year before and our hours spent serving specialized students at the secondary level were up a staggering 300%.

Make no mistake, we did not achieve this alone. Our volunteers may have done the work physically, but all of these milestones would not be possible without the continued support of our generous donors and wonderful community members. So you see, this is very much a team effort − Team Roxy™. As a team, we were able to bring comfort to countless more children in our community, and that is all that we strive for.

It is not lost on us that we have the good fortune to be entering our 15th

year because we continue to be graced with generous, caring donors, wonderful community partnerships, and extraordinary, dedicated volunteers.

Thank you. Thank you for supporting us, believing in us, and more importantly, enabling us to comfort and support the most vulnerable members of our society – the children. With your continued donations, support, and trust, we will continue to be a source of comfort for the children in our community for many years to come.

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The Board would like to extend a heartfelt thanks to all of the wonderful dogs and volunteers who make Roxy Therapy Dogs the professional, energetic, and compassionate organization it is. The community appreciates your presence and we on the Board continually hear how much your work and your dogs have made a difference.

Over the past year we've had the opportunity to hear directly from autistic and learning support professionals who have stressed the positive impact Roxy teams have in their classrooms, a 3rd grader who told us how his Roxy dog helped him learn to read, a NOVA advocate who prepares children for court in a high stress environment, an elementary school principal who described his appreciation for Roxy, and a high school counselor (and Board Member) who brought us to tears as she described the difference ten Roxy teams made to high school students and staff in the wake of a tragic suicide.

While Roxy teams are on the front line, the Board has been hard at work behind the scenes to ensure the sustainability and professionalism of the organization, discover new ways to connect with the community, and diversify our classroom

work. We are very excited to see the realization of an advanced education curriculum, which has been in the planning stages for a long time. Our new Certificate of Excellence Series is one more way Roxy can be better at what we do. Handlers tell us they would like to know more about how to work with special situations they might encounter in different programs, so this series is designed to provide insights from experts and advance the skills of our canine-assisted therapy dog teams. The first lecture and training lab will be "Insights Into the Child with Autism" and launches in March 2020. We also welcome parents, educators, other community members who think they might benefit, and non-Roxy therapy teams if dogs have a current therapy registration.




As we enter our 15th year, a new decade, and a new chapter, Roxy Therapy Dogs has a lot to celebrate!

Bring Comfort and Support to Thousands of Area Children

Elementary School Reading Inspiration

Roxy's flagship program gives young readers a chance to read aloud to a furry friend in small groups or one-on-one on a weekly basis. Dogs don't judge or correct, but serve as a calming influence, building students' confidence, improving reading skills, and fostering a love of reading.

Student Specialized Support

Students in Autistic, Multiple Disability, Life Skills, Learning Support, and Emotional Support classes benefit from regular Roxy visits that help them maintain a sense of calm, well being and an openness to stimuli and learning while also increasing social competence and developing a sense of empathy.

Secondary School Stress Relief

High school students struggling with stress and anxiety benefit from the muchneeded support and compassion provided by Roxy visits as part of Stress Management classes, organized support groups, and during exam times.

Courthouse Companionship

At the Bucks County Courthouse, Roxy therapy dogs comfort children navigating Dependency Court or who are victims of violent crime. Able to relax and remain calm with a dog by their side, children await their appointment to appear before a judge. On occasion, dogs are invited into the courtroom.

Pediatric Comfort

Roxy teams bring joy to children in hospital and healthcare settings. Roxy visits calm their fears, give them a break from medical procedures, and ultimately speed the healing process.








Elementary School Reading Inspiration

ROXY'S FLAGSHIP PROGRAM,

the Central Bucks School District's elementary school program is in its 15th year !! This program utilizes the calming effects of a therapy dog to help students become confident readers at all grade levels. Students who struggle with reading fluency, or who are uncomfortable reading aloud in front of their peers gain much needed confidence with a non-judgmental

canine friend by their side. The opportunity to practice reading aloud and develop this skill alongside a therapy dog is an invaluable tool and is the pathway to these students becoming confident life-long readers. We are so proud to be participating in over 120 classrooms and providing these benefits on a daily basis.





Student Specialized Support

My life skills class loves having Shay and Roni in our room. Before and after each visit my students are very excited and loving. They can't wait and ask each week if it is a 'Shay week.' It is something they look forward to and benefit from.

We are able to incorporate a lot of life lessons on trust, working together, being gentle and taking care of someone, responsibility, safe walking and love. Our time with Shay and Roni has helped us learn how to take turns and to walk next to someone sharing the same space.

One of the biggest take-a-ways is working on the anxiety of some of my students. We have overcome fears and anxiety by having them in our room."

A child not quite brave enough to interact with a therapy dog is thrilled to look into her doorway and see big handsome **Juma** in his bowler hat and tie or beautiful **Carlee** smile and strike a pose. A child might ask to watch **Josie** do tricks in the doorway one day and the next day be ready to touch **Maggie**'s soft curls with one little finger. A tyke can explore 100-pound **Boomer**'s ears as he lays Sphinx-like in the middle of the Hospital's bustling lobby. 





Once again in 2019, the Advancement Committee, with the help of Marketing and all of you, ran a successful Annual Appeal and #Giving Tuesday. We raised a total of \$7,704.30. Thank you to everyone who supported us.

Another critical fundraising effort for the Advancement team was, and is, to support the new Certificate of Excellence program, our educational initiative to provide advanced training for our teams and the general public in understanding the children we visit with autism, trauma issues, and more. Cheryl Luginbuhl, our experienced grant writer, has worked hard at successfully finding and writing grants to fund this program. She has already brought in \$7,500 from Foundations Community Partnership and has several other possibilities in the works!

The total raised in 2019 to support Roxy was \$32,313.

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


